





Aged just 16, Scottish comedian, writer and actor Daniel Sloss began writing for Frankie Boyle after his mother badgered the comedian about her funny son. Three years later, after performing stand-up himself, he is now one of the fastestrising stars on the comedy circuit, having released his debut DVD, Daniel Sloss Live, last year.

The newcomer I tip for the top is...
"Benny Boot. I gigged with Benny for the first time last year, and he's now one of the few acts I go out of my way to go and watch. He's incredible."
I would never joke about... "Nothing. I personally believe that everything can be joked about. As long as it's done in the right way. And if people get offended, tough – being offended is something you choose to do."











One of America's highest-grossing touring standups, 32-year-old Hart is America's answer to Michael McIntyre. With material on his cocaineaddicted jailbird father and being a father himself, his 2011 stand-up concert movie *Laugh At My Pain* grossed nearly £5m at the box office and his latest *Let Me Explain* is released in the States on 4 July this year. Last year he sold out the O2 in London after scene-stealing turns in *The Five-Year Engagement*. I first realised I was funny when... "I came out the womb. I was telling knock-knock jokes during my own birth."

I bombed the worst when... "I tried to impersonate other comedians. It wasn't until I got my own point of view that I started being funny."

My biggest influence is... "In a strange way, my dad, because he taught me how to do the right things by showing me the results of doing the wrong things."

The newcomer I tip for the top is... "No one! There is no room for any more people at the top!"

My guilty comic pleasure is... "Impressions. I would love to be able to do a good Bill Cosby. Now that's a show stopper!"

Aged 13, Greenfield was destined for a career in comedy after his Saturday Night Live-themed Bar Mitzvah. His TV break came in 1999 in MTV's comedy Undressed. He later became a series regular in Ugly Betty before making his name alongside Zooey Deschanel in New Girl as the vain, pompous, preening but loveable douche Schmidt, for which he has been nominated for both an Emmy and a Golden Globe. Next year, Greenfield, 32, will appear alongside Paul Rudd and Amy Poehler in

They Came Together, a new comedy from the director of *Role Models* and *Wanderlust*.

I first realised I was funny... "At the exact same moment I realised I wasn't cool. I was 26."



If I had to sum up my idea of comedy I'd say it... "Would be best described as grounded absurdity. Hike to stick a piece of gum between those two words and pull them as far apart as I can before it breaks"





Toronto-born Arnett dropped out of his Montreal university to pursue a career in acting. His big break came in 2003, landing the role of George Oscar "Gob" Bluth II in the greatest cancelled television show of all time, Arrested Development, which returns in May on Netflix. Now 42, Will stars in NBC sitcom *Up All Night*, and he'll be heard later this year voicing a petulant squirrel in animated

movie *The Nut Job*. Right now he's recording for his role in *Lego: Piece Of* Resistance. He's playing Batman.

My biggest influence is... "Withnail & I, because the

humour really comes out through a tragic story. Every scene continues to tell the story and I think that's essential for all comedy. I have pitched iokes for Arrested Development to Mitch [Hurwitz] and he will say:

'Yeah that's really funny, but it doesn't tell the story.' It doesn't tell the story that we're trying to tell, so we can't use it." The type of comedy I just don't get is...
